#### Feedback Obtained

Monthly feedback is collected from students through online. In addition to that student satisfactory survey is done in the month of February. This data is automatically analyzed in the system. This is utilized to guide the staff members and to assign extra duties. In the part of Capacity Building programme, every year feed back from teachers are collected manually and the data is analysed for the face lifting of the college and introducing of present market oriented courses in the forth coming years. The IQAC cell of the college collects the feed back from the employers who are the members of BoS in the concerned departments during their BOS meeting and also collected from those who have visited the institution during campus recruitment drives. Basing on the feedback from the employers, curriculum modifications and key skill training will be taken into consideration. Every year the feedback from alumni is collected on the yearly alumni meet and during the members visited the college. The collected data is analyzed by the Statistics department. This feed back is useful to improve infrastructure facilities and to improve the academic standards of students. Feed back from parents is obtained in parents' meeting organized in the college. The data is analyzed by the Statistics department and the inputs are helpful to improve the facilities to students.

Yes, Student mentoring system is available and successfully implementing in the institution. The students of a class consisting of 3060 students are assigned to a faculty member. The counsellor/mentor of that class monitors attendance and consolidate attendance every month, maintain student profiles consisting of their personal data, hobbies, skills and their progress from I semester to VI semester. Periodically the mentors conduct counselling the students about their overall development. The mentor provides constant support, guidance and help. The allotted students approach their mentor/ counsellor whenever they need his/her support the students are given a patient hearing by the counsellor and their needs are taken care of through counselling or representing them to the authorities concerned whether it is principal, hostel warden, district collector or RTC depot manager. 1. Academic mentoring focuses on improving students' overall academic achievement, raising student's grades, improving attendance, and curbing dropout rates. 2. Career mentoring helps the youth develop the skills needed to enter or continue on a career path, providing students with a role model who can familiarize them with the world of work and offer guidance and support as they prepare to make the transition from college to work or higher education. 3. Personality development mentoring supports youth during times of personal or social stress

and provides guidance for decision making. Students are encouraged in the activities of Lead India, Youth Red cross, NSS and Other Students centric activities. 4. Women students get special counselling related to their specific requirements through the woman faculty members and through the Women Empowerment Cell. 5. Other Support Services include Student Welfare Committee, Grievance Redressed Committee, Placement Career Guidance Cell, Antiragging Committee, Committee for People with Special Needs, Centre for Equal Opportunities, and Remedial Coaching.

5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

As there is a ban on student elections, the College does not have an elected Student council. However each class has a nominated class representative. The college has a student welfare committee with senior faculty members. The committee looks after the needs of the students and it conducts various activities Activities: 1. Conducting awareness programmes on anti ragging act and Right to information act. 2. Identifying the economically poor students of the college to provide assistance from student's aid fund irrespective of caste and religion. 3. Free Lunch is provided to poor students through local philanthropic and endowment organizations such as Kakinada Annadhana Samajam, Pynda's Choultry's, Mutta's Choultry 4. Organization of Graduation Day in Association with Controller of Examinations. 5. Organization of College Day competitions in Sports, Games, Elocution, Cultural events, Essay writing. 6. Conducting founder's day on 5th October every year. 7. The student welfare committee is financially assisted with Rs. 70000/ from college special fees funds. 8. The head of the institution conducts meeting with the class representatives to elicit information on their requirements. The teacher

counselors periodically convene meeting with their wards and counsel them on their horizontal and vertical progression and attend to their immediate needs. The student representatives are used in the distribution of study material, Calendars, magazines and for circulation of important notices. Students are involved in the special fee committees of the college formed for academics and administrations.
