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# Past Tense Verbs

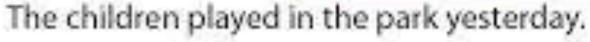
Past tense verbs describe an action that has

happened in the past.

Many past tense verbs are formed by adding, "ed", to the verb.

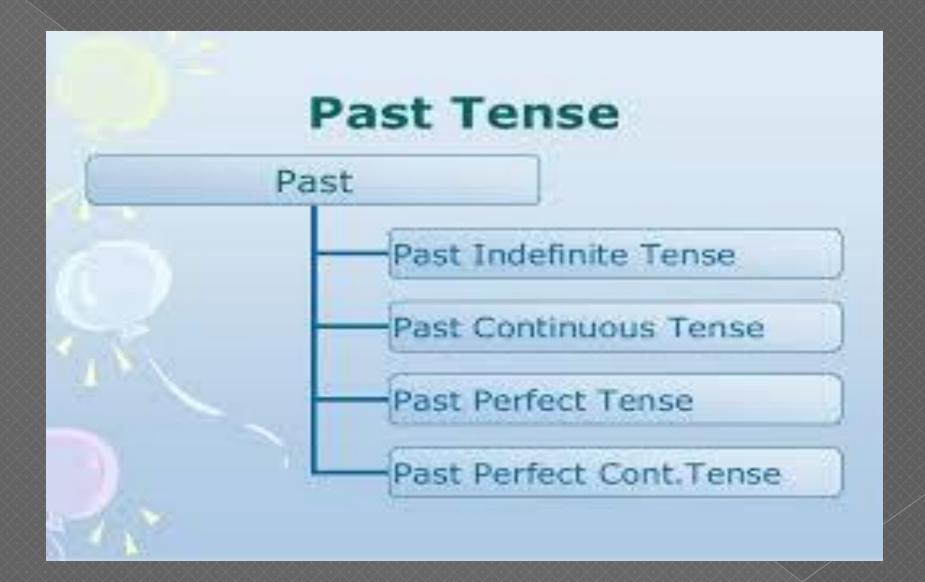
play - played









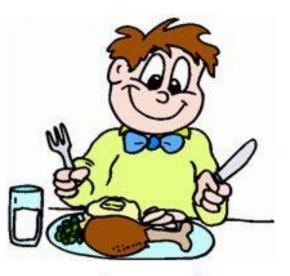




Perfect Continuous and ended in past Verb=had+been+V1+Ing

# The Simple Past Tense





eat - ate

3. The Simple Past can be used with a duration which starts and stops in the past. A duration is a longer action often indicated by expressions such as: for two years, for five minutes, all day, all year, etc.

#### Examples:

- I lived in Brazil for two years.
- Ruti studied Japanese for five years.
- They sat at the beach all day.
- They did not stay at the party the entire time.
- We talked on the phone for thirty minutes.



## PAST SIMPLE TENSE

TO BE

**S + Was/were**They were friends.

S + was not/were not + ...
They weren't friends.

?

Was/Were + S + ...?
They weren't friends.

Usage

To express completed action in the past

To describe a series of completed actions in the past

To express habits in the past

For stative verbs (have (own), be, think (believe), know, dislike, need, owe, wish

**VERBS** 

S + V-ed

She worked yesterday.

S + did not + verb (base form)

She didn't work yesterday.

Did + S + verb (in base form)?

Did she work yesterday?

Example

I saw a ghost last Friday.

I finished work, walked to the beach, and found a nice place to swim.

When I was young, I watched lots of television every day after school.

He had a small cottage in the woods.

## Simple Past (Examples)

Action that was completed in the past:

Tom went fishing last week.

I worked until 2:00 p.m. yesterday.

My family came to visit me last year

\*Time Expressions frequently used with the simple past: yesterday, last \_\_\_\_, past dates (in 1990), \_\_\_\_ ago, etc.

He met his wife 6 years ago.

I graduated from the university.

They watched a movie yesterday.

You went to the bed early.

She studied in the library.

They had dinner last night.

He felt sad yesterday.

We made a cake for you.

The police found some clues.

I became a teacher two years ago.

He didn't meet her.

I didn't graduate.

They didn't watch a movie.

You didn't go to the bed early.

She didn't study in the library.

They didn't have dinner.

The police didn't find any clues

I didn't become a teacher.

He didn't feel sad yesterday.

We didn't make a cake for you,

Did he feel sad yesterday?

Did they watch a movie?

Did he meet her?

Did she study in the library?

Did the police find any clues?

Did we make a cake for you?

Did you go to the bed early?

Did they have dinner last night?

Did I graduate?

Did I become a teacher?

#### Examples:

- I saw a movie yesterday.
- I didn't see a play yesterday.
- Last year, I traveled to Japan.
- Last year, I didn't travel to Korea.
- Did you have dinner last night?
- She washed her car.
- He didn't wash his car.

# Past Continuous Tense

Past Continuous Tense is to describe an action or activity going on at sometime in the past.





# PAST CONTINUOUS TENSE



S + was/were + V-ing

She was cooking all morning.



S + was/were + not + V-ing

She was not sleeping when he came home.

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Was/were + S + V-ing?

Was she sleeping when he came home?

#### Past Continuous Tense

Past continuous tense expresses the actions or task that were ongoing in the past. We cannot determine when the action started or finished.



- Sub+ was/were + V1(-ing)
- He was traveling to Venice.

- Sub + was/were + not + V1(-ing)
- He was not traveling to Venice.



Was he traveling to Venice?

Affirmative	Negative	Interrogative
I was playing.	I wasn't playing.	Was I playing?
You were playing.	You weren't playing.	Were you playing?
He was playing.	He <mark>wasn't</mark> playing.	Was he playing?
She was playing.	She <mark>wasn't</mark> playing.	Was she playing?
It was playing.	It wasn't playing.	Was it playing?
We were playing.	We weren't playing.	Were we playing?
You were playing.	You weren't playing.	Were you playing?
They were playing.	They weren't playing.	Were they playing?

#### **Positive Sentences**

- You were watching television last night.
- They were studying math yesterday.
- •I was washing the dishes when the phone rang.
- · As she was reading the book, Alice came.
- It was raining yesterday evening.

#### **Negative Sentences**

- You were not watching television last night.
- They were not studying math yesterday.
- I was not washing the dishes when the phone rang.
- As she was not reading the book, Alice came.
- It was not raining yesterday evening.

#### **Question Sentences**

- Were you watching television last night?
- Were they studying math yesterday?
- Was I washing the dishes when the phone rang?
- Was she reading the book when they came?
- Was it raining yesterday evening?

# PAST PERFECT TENSE

#### USE:

- √When two action occurred in the past.
- Speak the first action in past perfect tense.
- ✓ Speak the second action in simple past.

# The Past Perfect Tense

Pattern: had + past participle

It is used when there are two actions, one happens earlier than other. We use Past Perfect for the first action and Simple Past for the second. For example,

Example 1: He <u>had done</u> his homework <u>before</u> he went to play.

Example 2: <u>After</u> they <u>had had</u> dinner, they returned home.

#### PAST PERFECT TENSE

S + had + past participle + ...
She had finished the test.

S + had not/hadn't + past participle + ....
She hadn't finished the test.

? Had + S + past participle + ...?
Had she finished the test?

Usage

Example

+	-	?
I had been working	I hadn't been working	Had I been working?
You had been working	You hadn't been working	Had you been working?
He/she/it had been working	He/she/it had been working	Had he/she/it been working?
We had been working	We hadn't been working	Had we been working?
You had been working	You hadn't been working	Had you been working?
They had been working	They hadn't been working	Had they been working?
They had been working	They hadn't been working	Had they been working?
Working	working	0.000000

#### **Positive Sentences**

- I went there after I had completed the task.
- She had come late to the school.
- She had done her homework so she was happy.
- He had lived in Florida for ten years before he moved to California.
- · They had gone out when you called.
- By the time we came, she had finished the project.

#### **Negative Sentences**

- They had not (hadn't) been married when I was born.
- Until he went to England, he had not (hadn't) spoken English.
- You had not (hadn't) studied hard.
- · She had not (hadn't) done her homework so she was sad.
- He had not (hadn't) lived in Florida.
- They had not (hadn't) gone out when you called.

#### **Question Sentences**

- Had they been married when I was born?
- · Had he spoken English until he went to England?
- Had she done her homework?
- · Had he lived in Florida?
- Had they gone out when you called?
- Had the woman cried till the morning?

# Past Perfect Tense

Affirmative	Negative	Interrogative
I had decided.	I hadn't decided.	Had I decided?
You had decided.	You hadn't decided.	Had you decided?
He/ She/It had decided.	He/She/It hadn't decided !_	Had he/she/it decided?
We had decided.	We hadn't decided.	Had we decided?
They had decided.	They hadn't decided.	Had they decided?

# PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS TENSE

# **Past Perfect Continuous Tense**

Past Perfect Continuous Tense is used to express a continued or ongoing action that started in past and is continued until sometime in past. There will always a time reference like - for a few days, for ten months, for 2 years, since Wednesday, since 2011, since January etc.



#### PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS TENSE



#### **Positive Sentences**

- Thomas had been trying to repair the phone the whole day.
- We had been studying all day so we tired.
- Helen had been listening the same music for 4 hours when I came back home.
- Daniel had been watching TV for hours before he slept.
- You had been walking all afternoon on the beach.

#### **Negative Sentences**

- He had not (hadn't) been reading a book.
- I had not been cooking any meal when she came to my home.
- You had not been studying English all day.
- The actor had not (hadn't) been working since morning.
- The teacher had not been showing us a video when the bell rang.

#### **Question Sentences**

- Had her daughter been eating anything all day?
- Had she been working all day?
- Had he been reading a book?
- Had he been cooking any meal when she came to my home?
- Had the actor been working since morning?

#### Examples:

- They had been talking for over an hour before Tony arrived.
- She had been working at that company for three years when it went out of business.
- How long had you been waiting to get on the bus?
- Mike wanted to sit down because he had been standing all day at work.
- James had been teaching at the university for more than a year before he left for Asia.
- A: How long had you been studying Turkish before you moved to Ankara?
  - B: I had not been studying Turkish very long.
